December 4, 1999, Weimar, Germany: awarded international prize for philosophical essay entitled "Time's Language." The essay was entered in the Millennium International Essay Prize Contest, a modern revival of the old tradition of important and widely advertised academic prize questions in philosophy during the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Centuries. The contest was co-sponsored by the European cultural magazine *Lettre International*, Weimar 1999-Cultural Capital of Europe, and the Goethe Institute. The philosophical prize question was "Liberating the future from the past? Liberating the past from the future?," and the contest drew approximately 2,500 entries from 123 different countries. "Time's Language" was selected by a Preliminary Jury as one of 43 essays submitted to the Final Jury, and the latter then picked it to receive the second-place prize out of ten prizes awarded. The award included a cash prize of 30,000 Deutsche Marks (approximately \$16,000) and a fellowship for three months of study in Germany.

March 19, 1999, Strasbourg, France: became the first law professor to present a formal academic lecture (entitled "The Paradox of Remedies") to the judges and staff of the European Court of Human Rights.

Given the University of Washington Foundation Scholar Award for 1996, 1997 and 1998 by the Executive Council and Dean of the law school in recognition of excellence in scholarship and teaching (award includes research grant of \$6,000 per year).

Fulbright Scholar Award recipient in 1996, given to support course of research and lectures at the University of Ljubljana Faculty of Law, in Ljubljana, Slovenia.

Twice given “Professor of the Year” award (for 1992-1993 and 1999-2000) by the University of Washington Student Bar Association, upon vote of the student body and in recognition of excellence in teaching.
